This year's publication of the 32nd Edition is the first in 2 years, and we would like to express our gratitude for the understanding and cooperation of the elementary school students, junior high school students and others involved.

Now as over 70 years pass since the end of the war, opportunities to hear of war experiences from those who lived through it are becoming scarce. This situation makes the role of this collection all the more important, as a tool to encourage elementary and junior high school students to ponder the misery of war and nuclear weapons, and the importance and preciousness of peace. We believe that this collection will instill feelings of peace in those who read it and lead to a peaceful world to be handed down to future generations.

We hope this collection will be read by as many people as possible.
